

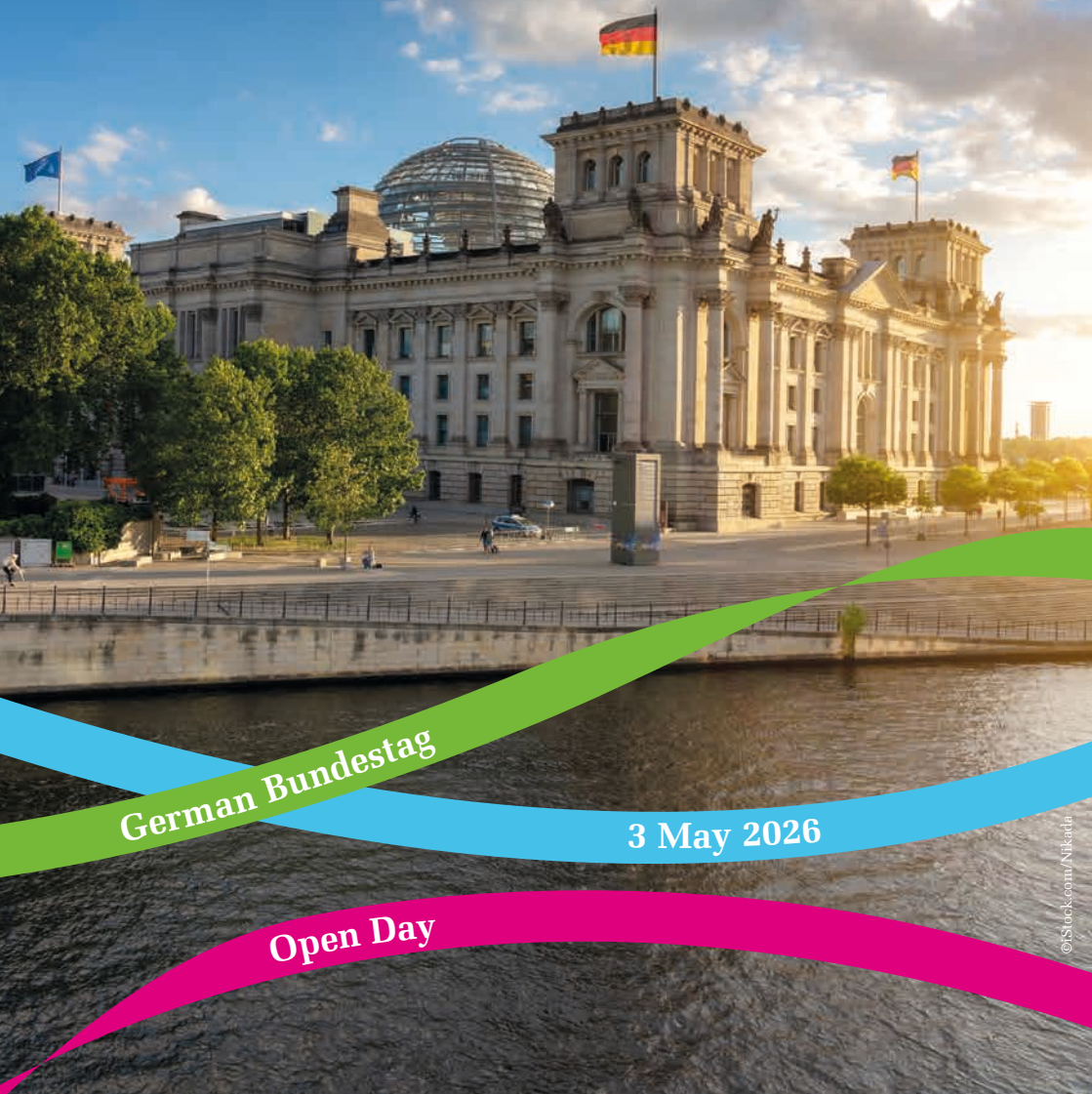

Dear guests, a warm welcome to the German Bundestag!

Today, we are not only opening our doors. We are opening a window to the heart of our democracy. For democracy is not merely the outcome of votes. It is the path that leads to them: paved with arguments, disagreements, the weighing-up of pros and cons – and ending in the taking of decisions.

It is clear that, from the outside, debates can often only be experienced via brief snippets or headlines. Today, you can gain a view of Parliament from the inside and see what parliamentary work really looks like: how bills are prepared, different positions presented, majorities emerge – and how these majorities sometimes

Get into conversation with the staff of the parliamentary administration – the people working behind the scenes to ensure that parliamentary procedures are transparent, reliable and ordered. Democracy needs clear rules – and people to underpin them.

At a time where political debates often appear /stripped of nuance and reduced to sound-bites, it is important for people to form their own impression. Parliament is not an abstract forum of “policymaking from above”. It is the “house of citizens”. The German Bundestag’s Open Day offers many opportunities for this: with tours, discussions, exhibitions, musical performances and interactive formats – including for younger visitors. Democracy is not a spectator sport. It thrives on interaction.

I wish you an informative day, with new perspectives – and perhaps also the occasional moment where you realise that: this parliament does not belong to its Members, it belongs to you.

We recommend starting your tour of all the buildings in the Marie-Elisabeth Lüders Building, before crossing the bridge over the River Spree to the Paul Löbe Building and using the underground walkway to reach the Reichstag Building to take a look at the plenary chamber.

We look at the big picture

An affordable life for everybody – only with Die Linke in the Bundestag

Unaffordable rents, horrendous heating bills, and weekly shopping has become even more expensive. Many people feel every day that life in Germany is becoming increasingly unaffordable. But at the same time, corporate bosses are earning horrendous amounts of money – and the Merz government is making sure that this does not change. Whether it's attacks on pensions, long-term care insurance or basic social security – anyone in this country who earns a normal income cannot rely on this government. At the same time, CDU and SPD are blocking the reactivation of the wealth tax. A tax that would make the super-rich in this country pay their fair share.

Die Linke in the Bundestag commissioned a study from Deutsche Institut für Wirtschaftsforschung (DIW) what impact the reintroduction of the wealth tax would have. The result: a total of 147 billion Euro would be made available. The money would directly benefit the federal states. Billions could be channelled into important tasks that are currently dramatically underfunded: intact schools with sufficient numbers of teachers, well-equipped hospitals, affordable housing, affordable public transport.

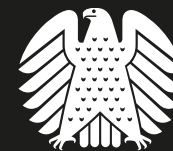
